



Campfire Rules and Disclaimer Document

- Campfires are defined by the Coconino County Wildfire Defense Ordinance 2024-01 as: “**CAMPFIRE**” means an open outdoor fire, which is used only for the cooking of food, providing for human warmth, or for recreational purposes.
- A Campfire is not intended for disposal of large amounts of forest debris. A debris burn notification should be submitted for disposal of large amounts of forest debris collected at your residence.
- Trash is not allowed to be burned at any time.
- Make sure to always be in attendance until your fire is extinguished.
- A hose with a nozzle attached must be at the location while the fire is burning.
- A tool must be on site to allow for full stirring of the fire while extinguishing.
- ARS 13-1706. It is unlawful for any person, without lawful authority to intentionally, knowingly recklessly or criminal negligence to set or cause to be set on fire any wildland other than the person’s own or permit a fire that was set or caused to be set by the person to pass from the person’s own grounds to the grounds of another person. A person who violates this section is guilty of a class 1 misdemeanor, class 2 misdemeanor, class 3 felony or class 6 felony.

In case of emergency, call 9-1-1

Once Fire Restrictions are put in place, this burn notification is null and void until all fire restrictions are lifted by Coconino County. No burn notifications will be accepted during the time any fire restrictions are in place by Coconino County.
